Healthy Hope Mini Notes

Last Sunday was a church service to put a note in our Hope History books. Pastor Keith was giddy as he prepared to give and receive communion for the first time since March. If you were unable to attend, communion was distributed by members to each car in individually prepared zip lock bags that contained the wafer and the wine. Members received communion in this way plus 3 youth received their first communion along with their families at the altar that was set up. The sun was shining and it was truly a moment to rejoice. Many great comments have been shared from members on our summer time "parking lot" church. It is a unique way to enjoy God's beauty as well as hear the Word and visit with each other while social distancing. I for one, always looked forward to Mission Festival and often said I wish we had church outside more often. God works in mysterious ways!

July 28 is Hepatitis awareness day. Do you know the ABC's of Hepatitis? Did you even know there were several types of hepatitis?

- Hepatitis A is a contagious liver infection caused by the Hepatitis A virus. Normally people that have
 this feel sick for a few weeks to a few months, recover completely with little to no lasting effects to
 the liver. Type A is found in stool and blood of those with the virus. It is found in contaminated
 food. There is a safe and effective vaccine to prevent this virus. If you eat, you are at risk for the
 virus, so get the vaccine.
- Hepatitis B is caused by the Hepatitis B virus. It can be spread from a woman to her unborn baby.
 This virus can cause serious liver damage, especially in young children and lead to chronic or
 lifelong infection and even cancer. This vaccine is now given at birth. Many were infected prior to a
 vaccine and all pregnant women are screened for this virus. This type of hepatitis is easily
 preventable with a vaccine.
- Hepatitis C is spread through blood transfusion, organ transplant and sharing needles. It has been screened for in blood donation since 1990 and virtually eliminated by transfusion by 1992. C can be spread by sex with an infected person, needle stick by healthcare provider from infected person, birth to an infected mother, and body piercings or tattoos by an unlicensed or informal setting. There is currently no vaccine for Hepatitis C. Once diagnosed, treatment is available if caught prior to severe liver disease.
- There is also Hepatitis D that occurs only in those with hepatitis B. Vaccination for Hepatitis B will prevent this virus.
- Hepatitis E is found in feces of an infected person. It can be ingested from eating undercooked or raw venison, wild boar, shellfish or pork. There is no vaccine and is rare in the USA.
